PHILOSOPHY

The Minor in Philosophy provides an opportunity for students majoring in other disciplines to explore what philosophy has to offer. Philosophy allows students to explore life's most fundamental questions, teaches them to think critically and gain an understanding of logic, while also improving their writing. Possession of a Minor in Philosophy shows potential employers that a graduate is able to analyze and solve critical problems, write well, and adapt to varying employment demands. The critical, analytical and argumentative skills that students acquire through studying philosophy are very applicable to legal careers, the pursuit of an MBA, careers in management, and in technical and critical writing. The minor is structured so that, after taking the introductory course in symbolic logic, students have considerable flexibility in their choice of courses while being exposed to the breadth of the discipline.
